

## Planning and supporting permanence in long-term foster care

An investigation of the implementation in England of the first Regulations and Guidance for long-term foster care as a permanence option (DfE 2015)

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Long-term foster care has been one of the permanence options available for children in care since the 1980s, but it was not officially defined by Government until the Long-term Foster Care Regulations and Guidance (2015). The aim was to improve outcomes for children by requiring local authorities to establish procedures to assess, match and support children and long-term foster families, and to identify children in long-term foster placements in their SSDA903 submission to the Department for Education.

### **This study involves:**

- An **analysis of the national data** on children in long-term foster care and their pathways using Children in Need and SSDA903 data.
- **Surveys for all local authorities** regarding their procedures and practices for long-term foster care, including those for ensuring that care plans for long-term foster care are being implemented as required by Regulations and Guidance.
- **Research interviews with managers** from a sample of around 30 local authorities who represent different profiles and procedural systems, to obtain more detailed insights and to identify good practice.
